paint, paper and ink. I sketch and paint outdoors constantly. Working en plein air has taught me to be observant to

the effects of light and atmosphere. I take this knowledge with me into the studio. Being an artist is an endless journey... always struggling to achieve one's best work. The struggle keeps my work honest and direct."

Watercolor In Review

SHERRY GRAINGER

Sherry is a 7 year member of GCWS and currently co-chairs Programs for the Society. Sherry has been painting in watercolor since 1969, when she studied with the late Irving Shapiro at the American Academy of Art in Chicago, IL. Sherry loves trying new colors and methods, so she will be reviewing those things for everyone's information.


This June in honor of all the beautiful flowers blooming across the state, we will be examining Schminke's Brilliant Red Violet. It is semi-transparent. It is staining. It does granulate slightly. It has excellent lightfastness. Its pigment number is PV55.



Brilliant Red Violet has excellent flow and works well to paint flowers as follows:

- 1. Wet the paper slightly.
- 2. Using a round brush, drop a tea consistency brush full of paint onto the damp paper and allow it to move and spread.
- 3. Wait a few minutes for that wash to lose its sheen and put a dot of cream consistency paint into the middle of a flower shape to create the center and throat of the blossom as it spreads into the previous layer of paint.
- 4. While the paint is still damp with no sheen, being careful to avoid the center dot of heavy pigment, take a watercolor pencil of roughly the same color (or a contrasting color) and outline the flower. In the small sketch shown, the pencil used was Derwent Inktense Shiraz 0600.
- 5. With a rigger brush, use tea to milk consistency Phthalo Yellow Green (DS)** or Skip Green (American Journey) to add foliage. The glass container was painted with a tea consistency

round brush full of Holbein's Verditer Blue** on damp paper with the stems painted into it with cream consistency greens using a rigger brush.



Brilliant Red Violet mixes well. Its use is not limited to flowers, combined with Prussian Blue **or Payne's Grey to make dramatic sunset/sunrise skies or shadows.

Intuitive Painting with Watercolor and Gouache

November 8-10, 2023

Arts@302, 302 S Main St, Broken Arrow, OK

\$350 – enrollment opens July 13th and will be limited to 12

"This workshop is designed to teach all levels of students to paint intuitively, starting without preconceived notions or outcome. There will be no preliminary planning or drawing. Process will dictate direction as students use ink pen, watercolor, and gouache to implement elements and principles of design. Instruction will start with random marks, then color using a mixture of watercolor and gouache to create a library of design elements. There will be much discussion on the definition of intuitive painting. There will also be regular comments and evaluation of student work in progress, mostly concerning relationships between elements and principles. It is entirely possible that finished work may be representational, but the goal is work which is compositionally pleasing and aligned with the artist's personal aesthetic."

Artist and workshop instructor Stan Kurth has drawn and painted most of his life. Stan lives with the conviction of "fear not" and that same attitude permeates not just his life but his art. His focus and dedication to his work have earned him signature member status in several watercolor societies including the National Watercolor Society, San Diego Watercolor Society, and the Western Federation of Watercolor Societies - Master.

I joined GCWS because I wanted to learn more and be challenged by the artists that are members, plus the many other benefits, such as making new friends.


My favorite colors are red, yellow, and blue.
