Framing your art can be daunting and expensive. Can you save money and do it yourself? What do you need to know to successfully do that? If you are having someone else frame it, what do you need to specify to get the result you want and that will meet requirements for show exhibitions? Member **Jo Lynch** will help answer all these questions.

Jo will also talk about the first step in curating your personal palette which is getting to know your colors. An important part of that process is swatching them out, learning the properties of each paint, and seeing how many hues you can get from just one tube of paint. Come see the custom-made stamp that will assist in swatching along with the plastic sleeves to store your swatches. These "swatching kits" will also be available to order and the custom-made swatching stamp will also be available at future paint studios for you to use.

Jim suggests thinking about what you can add to your composition to make it more interesting: figures, birds, wagons, carts, chickens, whatever. When I look at the painting with just the buildings, a sky and mountains, it was needing something more! It was "sterile" or "boring." Trace on a piece of paper and paint an example to see if this is what you want to add. Remember light sources and shadows to make your additions interesting and let the viewer fill in the blanks.

Richard Stephens is a native of Hot Springs, Arkansas, and graduated from the University of Central Arkansas in 1969 with a degree in art.

After serving in the Army as an illustrator, he began his commercial art career in 1971 with a design studio in Little Rock. There, he began forming a network of other artists, vendors and suppliers that allowed him to open his own studio in 1974 and has been freelancing out of Hot Springs since that time. After discovering the medium in college he always knew water-color was his real "calling". Occasionally it would emerge, but he didn't start painting consistently again until 1992.

Although recognized for his landscape, architectural and figurative work Stephens feels the real subjects of most of his paintings are his brushwork and the light he tries to capture and amplify through value contrast and an unexpected color pallet. Believing that drawing is the foundation for all good art and design, Stephens often allows his pencil work to show through and become an engaging element in his watercolors. Stephens says, "My goal is to interpret, not to render. I want to engage the viewer, entertain him and share my vision. When people view my work that is the last step in the painting process. Of course I want people to like my like it or hate it, I don't want them to be indifferent."

I asked Sherry Peters (Grainger) the following question and she responded with info I think would be helpful to others.

My question:

"The last few days I've been working on an abstract piece, while also trying to employ design principles. This has led me to Balance and Dominance. I'd value your input on a few questions: can you have both? Does one trump the other? Does the artist need to pick one or the other? Becky Brady

Her answer: You can have both. You probably should have both. Balance rests the eyes and mind. It promotes cohesion as well. This is particularly important in an abstract piece because "representational" clues are either missing or at a minimum. Balance in color, size, and shape is key to the final result because abstraction should look just as smooth and integrated as a representational piece, even when the abstract piece features jagged shapes or lines. Dominance sets mood. It should also promote the work's focal point(s). It should signal to the viewer things about the work. Dominance prevents boredom. It should also indicate any theme or message the artist is attempting to give the viewer.


